Black is associated with elegance, as in 'black tie' parties, where people are expected to dress smartly. However, it is also associated with fear, which is why black cats are sometimes seen as unlucky.

Blue is seen as a relaxing, peaceful color, but is sometimes associated with sadness, such as when people say they're 'feeling blue'.

How about September? September's color is thought by many people to be brown – the color of the earth and contentment.

'<u>For</u>' is used for periods of time with a beginning and end:


I slept for 10 hours.
