However, people were still continuing to fall in love, and so the Roman priest

Valentine began to secretly Marry those couples that came to him. When Claudius found



out he sent Valentine to prison, and it is believed that while in prison Valentine himself fell in love with the jailer's daughter, and sent her a love letter, which he signed 'from your valentine'.

Claudius later had Valentine beheaded on February 14<sup>th</sup>, which was the date of an ancient Roman love festival.

It is for these two reasons that we celebrate love on this day.

♥Don Juan – A hero of Spanish folklore, it is believed that during his youth he had been the lover of 1000 women!
