Doctor Daniel Margoliash of UC, San Diego tells us, "It would no longer be an insult to be called a bird-brain"! Why? He and his colleagues have been engaged in some very interesting research with the help of a few of their little feathered friends.

European Starlings can display exceptional virtuosity as songbirds and mimics. But, what the researchers have discovered is that the little Starling can also grasp the concept, and the use of, (bird) grammar! It's true, say the Professors!! Starlings can be taught grammar in their own language of chirps, warbles, trills, whistles and rattles. They "accurately recognize acoustic patterns defined by a recursive, self-embedding, context-free grammar" says Timothy Gentner, another researcher on the project.
