The success of this advertising campaign has created the legend that Coca-Cola actually invented the modern-day image of Santa Clause, with his red-and-white costume, to promote the company's colors. But, in fact, Coca-Cola chose

the red-and-white version of Santa over a variety of competing figures in order to help establish red and white, their colors, as the accepted image of Santa Clause. The legend, then, is not exactly true.
