From the very beginning of civilization, and in all corners of the world, man has relied upon this animal for food

and clothing, as well as for labor when the going gets too tough for man alone. Is it any wonder that we have venerated this animal for thousands of years?

Without the cow and her cousins, where would we be? We have even included bulls and cows in our sports. Everyone is aware of Spain's famous "Bull Fights" with its ritual splendor, matadors, toreadors and all; and, of course, the killing of the bulls. But this "sport" is only a relatively new version of a much older – one could say "kinder" (to the bulls, at least) - sport that existed in the ancient world many thousands of years ago.



Perhaps the most famous records of this ancient sport can be found in archeological sites on Crete. The Minoan civilization flourished there about 4,000 years ago and, going by the evidence, they enjoyed sport especially "bull-leaping". Both young men and women participated in this sport. Unlike modern day bull-fighting, bullleaping does not harm the bull, although it's pretty dangerous for the "leaper"! The idea is to face a charging bull, grab its horns as it reaches you and, using the bull's instinctive urge to raise its head at the moment of impact, fly into the air, land on the bull's back and summersault onto the ground behind the bull as it charges away! Now, that's a Sport!

Evidence of this kind of bull-leaping has been found in other ancient cultures from about the same time and the practice still exists today in



southern France and northern Spain (although cows are used more often than bulls).
