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In 2001, in Israel, the famous pianist and conductor. Daniel Barenboim. performed prelude to Richard Wagner's Tristan undIsolde, opera breaking the ban on the composer's music which had been Wagner 1813-1883 in place since the founding of the

state in 1948. A national controversy and condemnation from the Israeli prime minister was the result.

Wagner was born on the 22nd of this month, almost 200 years ago in Leipzig, Germany. He is a controversial figure. Though many have a low opinion of the man they regard the artist as almost superhuman.

Wagner grew up in a theatrical family and his primary interest was opera. Unlike other supremely gifted musicians Wagner was not a child prodigy: he did not even start to compose until his late teens and was an indifferent pianist. On top of that, his musical education was sketchy (a few years of composition lessons starting at the age of 15). Wagner worked as musical director at various

opera houses in the part of his career, concentrating on position. He never made much money. Though in debt for most of his life, Wagner could only compose in an atmosphere of luxury, insisting on silk wall hangings, cushions and clothes, and exotic perfumes. He had no shame in asking his friends, or total strangers, for 'loans' (which, of course, he

never intended to

pay back).

His early operas follow the example of such composers as Weber and Meyerbeer. His later works explore Teutonic and Norse mythology, the foremost example being Der Ring Des Nibelungen, a 15-hour cycle of four operas that took 26 years to write. Wagner wrote both the music and, unusually, the libretto. The Ring was first performed in 1876 in a specially designed (by Wagner, of course) theatre in Bayreuth. Many people are inspired to learn German to fully appreciate this epic work. Half way through his work on the Ring Wagner took off in other directions – composing the operas Tristan und Isolde and Die Meistersinger before returning 12 years later to finish his tetralogy. Tristan is an intense and passionate work and ends with the overpowering Liebestod (literally 'love death').

Wagner held pronounced anti-Semitic views and was Hitler's favourite composer. Daniel Barenboim (who is Jewish) has said of Wagner: " Wagner, the person, is absolutely appalling, despicable, and, in a way, very difficult to put together with the music he wrote, which so often has exactly the opposite kind of feelings ... noble, generous, etc." Barenboim believes that the contradictions within Wagner should "actively considered" and that, rather than censorship, people should be allowed to make up their own minds about him.

And, if they like it, they can join up in our 1+1 campaign, or just join the "easy start" caféclub. We welcome everyone to pop in and have a look around.

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
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
