43600 YEAR OLD CLONE


Currently airing on-line is a SF TV series called "Foundation," It is loosely based on a series of novels and short stories by the American author, Isaac Asimov. In the TV series, a trio of human clones, "Dawn", "Day" and "Dusk", who are "descendents" of Cleon 1st, have ruled the 12.000 year old Galactic Empire continuously for the past 400 years. They are genetically identical to each other and when one dies, another is "resurrected" from a clone "bank" containing Cleon's DNA. The clones serve as the personification of the Empire's permanency and consistency.

Cleon's descendent clones live in a fictional fantasy-world supposedly 1,000's of years into the future. Today's scientists have also been able to create clones (remember Dolly the sheep from 1997?) thanks to the advancement of modern technology.

But apart from the intervention of science and human technology (imaginary or otherwise), clones do actually occur naturally in nature.

Take, for example, the 43,600 year old, King's Holly. Like most plants, King's Holly flowers, but its flowers do not produce seeds or fruit of any kind. So, how does it propagate?





The King's Holly plant has survived for at least 43,600 years (some estimates put its age at 135,000 years!) by cloning itself. It does this by dropping branches onto the nearby soil which then take root and grow into new plants.

Today, all of the existing 300-odd critically endangered plants of this species grow within one, single narrow stretch of land just over a kilometre in length, in Tasmania, Australia. And as all the plants in the colony have been reproduced vegetatively, they are genetically identical to each other — i.e., clones.

The individual shrubs, or small trees, in the colony grow incredibly slow at a rate of about 0.26 mm per year. Dendrochronology (using growth rings to determine a tree's age) dated one stem to be 240 years old! They can reach a height about 8 meters.

King's Holly, or *Lomatia tasmanica*, to give it its scientific name, was first discovered in 1934 by Charles Denison King, a miner and avid naturalist, while prospecting for tin in south-western Tasmania. In 1965, he found a second colony about 5 km from his first discovery (which unfortunately had died out by then) and sent a clipping to the University of Tasmania. Both the plant and its discoverer are now celebrated in botanical circles.
