# Summer Remedies

Have you noticed how hot it is this summer? Silly question, huh? The real question is what to do about it? Well, here are a few suggestions from around the world that might offer a solution – if you're willing to try them....

Everyone knows Australia is a hot place, and during summer up north in Darwin, it gets *really* hot. So, the locals decided to thumb their noses at the sun and have some fun.

At first the solution was, in the best Australian tradition, simple; drink lots of beer. Beer has a cooling effect (they drink it chilled in Australia) and by the time you've finished 4 or 5 cans, you really don't notice the heat any more. This was an excellent remedy, but it had a negative side-effect - hundreds of empty beercans were being left all over the place, on footpaths, on roads, in parks and in other recreational areas. Darwin was getting a bad reputation!

So in 1974 the Darwin Local Tourist Promotion Association came up with a solution to the beer-can litter problem; they organized a beer-can regatta! That's right, they invited competitors to race in boats made out of empty, discarded beer-cans. This event has been held annually ever since, attracting crowds of up to 15,000 spectators each year, and the place now looks much cleaner, too!

But Australia is not the only place where the summer heat becomes intolerable. The Belgians have a similar solution for this problem – a *bathtub* regatta! On August 15th every year, participants compete in the 1km Régate de Baignoires down the Meuse River in Dinaut (about 100Km from Brussels), something they have been doing regularly since 1982.



If you're thinking of entering this race, the rules are very simple: your "boat" must have a bathtub somewhere in its design and must be manually-propelled – no motors allowed!

There is no limit on the number of "crewmembers" each craft can have, nor is there any limit on the designs used to augment each bathtub, so long as a tub is part of that design.

Each year about 50 tubs take part in this regatta and it attracts about 25,000 people, including "sailors" and spectators.

Then, for the really adventurous, every August there is the "World Bog Snorkelling Championship" at Llanwrtyd Wells in Wales, UK. This event has been held regularly since 1988 and it attracts enthusiasts from all over the world.

Competitors are required to complete two laps of a 55 meter long water-filled trench that organizers have cut through a peat bog. They are not allowed to "swim" in the conventional sense; rather they are restricted to leg-power only. They are permitted to wear snorkels, masks and flippers. A wetsuit is optional. Each competitor enters the bog-trench alone and the winner is the one who finishes the two laps in the shortest time.

This event is hugely popular, and attracts 100's of spectators, volunteers (to help set it up) and competitors every year.

And what is a peat bog, you may ask? Dark, smelly, muddy water full of all kinds of creepycrawlies. Can't wait to get there, right?
